Two papers are required of each student taking the course for full credit. Each paper must be typed, double-spaced, 8–15 pages including cover sheet, outline, footnotes (or endnotes), and bibliography. **Submit the papers to Ken Lowe via email.**

Paper #1: Interpretation of Psalm 40:6–10

- The paper must be the student's interpretation of these verses with the help of any resources available.
 - Research should be conducted in available commentaries, special studies, and translations. Online electronic materials are acceptable.
- The interpretation is to be supported from the context and from parallel passages in any other pertinent portions of the Bible, including the New Testament.
- Any interpretative problems should be discussed clearly.
 - o Identify the interpretative problem.
 - o Give alternative interpretations.
 - o Discuss the pros and cons for each interpretation.
 - o Identify which interpretation you arrive at and defend it.

Writing Procedure:

- 1. Identify context—look for any background information provided by the psalm heading(s) or by the psalm itself.
- 2. Look for literary devices (e.g., repetition, inclusio, refrain, chiasm, etc.).
- 3. Study key words (no more than four—do not study every word).
 - Use a concordance to find the uses of key words in the passage.
 - Find other biblical references using the same words or having the same thought.
 - Give any information from commentaries or other sources that help you to identify the use and meaning of the key words.
- 4. Identify the main thought of the passage in your own words.
- 5. Discuss interpretative problems and offer solutions (giving pros and cons).
 - Be certain you have presented adequate reasons for your chosen interpretation.
- 6. Suggest specific application(s) to life.
- 7. Include all resources you used in a bibliography at the end of your paper.

Paper #2: Preaching or Teaching a Psalm of Your Choice

- The paper must be the student's choice of text with the help of any resources available.
 - Research should be conducted in available commentaries, special studies, and translations. Online electronic materials are acceptable.
- The paper will proceed to produce either a sermon or a Bible lesson for the chosen psalm.
- The sermon/lesson should include:
 - o Brief introduction to the psalm.
 - o An outline for the psalm.
 - o An orderly treatment of the psalm's text.
 - Clear identification of the psalm's implications for practical, devotional, and theological application.
 - Several illustrations that will help your hearers to understand the psalm and its applications.

Writing Procedure:

- 1. Identify context—look for any background information provided by the psalm heading(s) or by the psalm itself.
- 2. Look for any large key literary devices (e.g., repetition, inclusio, refrain, chiasm, etc.).
- 3. Study two key words—choose only the most important two words.
- 4. Identify the main thought of the passage in your own words.
- 5. Give a clear interpretation or exposition of the passage.
 - Be certain you have presented adequate reasons for your chosen interpretation.
- 6. Suggest specific application(s) to life.
- 7. Include all resources you used in a bibliography at the end of your paper.
